2019 Proposal Submissions Summary

Total Submissions (n=190)

This year we received a total of 173 Paper and 17 Session submissions. Based on information reported in previous SIG newsletters, this quantity does not represent a new record. However, it does represent the 3rd highest number of submissions since 2012.

Disqualified Submissions (n=7)

We screened all of the submissions prior to assigning reviewers to ensure that they were related in some way to our broad early childhood focus, blinded, and met the 2,000 word limit (or roughly 5 single-spaced pages or 7 double-spaced pages). Six paper submissions were disqualified due to not uploading a proposal document (n=4), exceeding the 2,000 word limit (n=1) or actually being a session proposal (n=1). In addition, 1 session submission was disqualified due to actually being a single paper.

It should be noted that AERA does not allow the Program Committee to transfer submissions between "format types," and so our only option for these two latter "incorrect format type" submissions was to request that they be disqualified.

Transferred Submission (n=1)

A final paper submission was transferred due to not fitting the SIG's early education or child development focus.

Reviewed Submissions (n=182)

We assigned 3 topic-relevant reviewers (and from our pool of 81 non-student volunteers) to each of the remaining 166 Paper submissions and 16 Session submissions. We also assigned at least one proposal to each of the 34 volunteer Graduate Student Reviewers. However, these latter scores did not count toward the average scores. All of the reviewers were alerted about their assignments via bulk email on August 10, 2018.

Conference Program Process

To determine whether to accept or reject a submission, we considered the overall average score, normalized scores, and reviewers' comments and accept/reject recommendations. In the case of widely varying reviewer scores or comments, we read the submission ourselves and in some cases "overruled" the outlier reviewer.

AERA allotted the SIG a total of 16 paper sessions and 60 roundtables or posters. We set aside 7 sessions for individual papers (and with 6 papers each) and the remaining 9 for session (AKA symposia) proposals. Then, to determine whether an accepted submission was slotted as a paper, roundtable, or poster, we considered its focus and the extent to which we could group it with similarly focused accepted proposals.

Our final program contained:

- 102 paper submissions, for a 59% acceptance rate. This papers were presented as part of:
 - o 7 Sessions (n=42)
 - 8 Roundtables (n=28)
 - o 2 Poster sessions (n=32)
- 9 session proposals, for an acceptance rate of 53%.

Thank you to everyone who submitted a proposal to the SIG, and especially to those of you who served as our volunteer reviewers!
